

Dear Zion,

In the gospel of Mark, Jesus says, "Salt is good, but if the salt has lost its saltiness, how will you make it salty again? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another."

I'm convinced we need silence, we need to intentionally seek time and space where we are not engaging our "calculating mind." We are nurtured spiritually by silence in a way we cannot be by learning more theories, accomplishing more tasks, or even reading the Bible more often. In September, we celebrated God's creation together, noting how God pronounced our world *Good*. A world so created by a loving Creator ought not find us wallowing in anxiety, anger, and disconnection from one another. Finding a way to see differently in silence, to draw from the *Good* rather than be constantly driven to achieve something or will ourselves to be better is not some kind of New Age concept, but rests at the foundation of our faith tradition. Jesus's ministry began after 40 days of silence in the Judean wilderness. In the desert, there are no distractions, especially from one's self, and Jesus chose to begin from this place, this silence to ensure all He did and said on earth would be drawn only from God's goodness.

It is not an easy practice to begin, especially in a culture where production and business have become our masters. There is nothing to gain from simply being still and breathing, we believe. It feels awkward, and one might be taken by a sense of guilt because nothing is being attained: no degree, no knowledge, no certificate, nothing. This, of course, is how contemplative prayer/silence/meditation appears to the calculating mind.

I would like to offer a time where we could meet for a contemplative prayer class at Zion. It would be an extension and deepening of our 60 seconds before our service together on Sundays. I believe with all of my heart that this is a way to make our faith communities "salty" again.

Over the last thirty years, I've been a part of more groups as a student and teacher than I can recall, so doing it at Zion would be simple enough. I realize we are all busy and another obligation is not appealing, so let's talk with one another over the next few weeks and see if we cannot find an easy way to make a contemplative prayer class a reality at Zion.

# Fill the Hunger Cart



## White Sunday Comes to Zion

Join the Zion family on <u>October 14</u> for a new faith tradition as we observe White Sunday. The children of our congregation will lead our worship service. All members of the church can participate by wearing white. We will also celebrate with a pot-luck lunch after the service.

- Wear white to church on October 14.
- Bring a dish to share at the after-church pot-luck lunch.

### Learning about White Sunday

White Sunday is a Samoan holiday that is celebrated in almost every Samoan community around the world. This memorable day is referred to as Lotu Tamaiti, Aso Sa Pa'epa'e or Children's Service. Traditionally, children wear formal white clothes for the occasion. White Sunday falls on the second Sunday in October. It consists of two services, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The morning service is the Sunday school and youth program. The afternoon service is for the entire family. The general practice is that children are given the responsibility of planning the church service. The children practice for several months before the big day, often putting on skits from Bible stories, singing songs, and often the older children will be responsible for the day's sermon or message, reading the scripture and the prayer. The service begins with the children's parade. After the morning service is a family feast where the children are served first. In many families the children are excused from chores.

The day before White Sunday, women of the congregation gather together to set up the church. They bring fresh flowers such as plumerias and white gingers, as well as ferns The flowers are woven together to make long strands to decorate the church. At the same time, they prepare the "pales" or head bands for the children. Afterwards, they will start baking pies and cakes for the special day. Meanwhile, the men of the congregation are either at the plantation getting the biggest taros and bananas, preparing the underground stove or "Umu", or fishing. There is always a size 2 pig for the feast. The main menu is usually taro, bananas, "Palusami", taro leaves with coconut milk and onions, fish, pig, ham, fruit salad, potato salad, pies, cakes, Jello and of course ice cream.

From where and when does White Sunday originate? The most believable version of its origins is that it started from the aftermath of the 1919 influenza epidemic in which 20% of the Samoan population in Western Samoa died from the flu. Every Samoan family was visited with multiple tragedies and many of those who died were children. It is believed that White Sunday was both a way of bringing families together to remember those who had died and to celebrate the lives of the children who had lived.

## 'Cultivating Generous Congregations' draws a crowd to Cleveland

To build a culture of generosity through collaboration and cooperation to continue the mission and ministry of the United Church of Christ, representatives of 35 of the denomination's 38 Conferences gathered at the Church House in Cleveland this week, participating in an event aimed at building the fund development capacity of UCC Conferences, Associations, and local Congregations.

Twenty-five Conference Ministers participated in the event which began Tuesday evening, September 18, and adjourned Friday morning, September 21.

"Our time together will deepen the partnership necessary for the National and Conference Settings of the UCC to work together to raise the funds necessary to carry out our mission at every level — local Church, Conference, and National," said the Rev. Andy DeBraber, a major gift officer in the UCC Office of Philanthropy, Technology, Identity and Communication (OPTIC).

A new approach to fundraising became necessary when the UCC General Synod retired the Pattern of Giving in 2017 and adopted a New Ecology of Generosity. The National Setting of the UCC, specifically the Philanthropy and Steward-ship team, now part of OPTIC, was charged with its development.

This week's gathering, 'Cultivating Generous Congregations,' is an interactive seminar that changes the way churches and congregations approach giving and generosity. It was developed and co-facilitated by the Lake Institute on Faith & Giving at the Lilly School of Philanthropy at Indiana University. The UCC has contracted with the Lake Institute to host six to eight Cultivating Generous Congregations seminars around the country from 2017-2020. Cleveland is hosting the third event, with others previously held in Wichita, Kan., and Wenatchee, Wash.

"The world of fund development has shifted significantly over the last 30 years while fundraising in the church largely stayed the same," said DeBraber, one of the seminar's facilitators. "Now we are playing catch up and taking this opportunity to develop best practices in every setting of the UCC."



OPTIC has been working to do that, in workshops around the country during the past year. With Giving & Stewardship workshops at conference annual meetings, in Money & Ministry Workshops in partnership with the other UCC-affiliated financial ministries, and during individual consultations with conferences, associations, churches, and pastors, all settings of the Church continue to work out new protocols as they work together around stewardship and fundraising.

Based on comments from participants, the Cleveland event was very well received. "This has been a terrific event," said the Rev. Franz Rigert, Conference minister, Wisconsin Conference UCC. "It's a great gift from the National Setting to the Conferences."

The seminar specifically focused on the needs of Conferences around stewardship and raising money. It's hoped that participants are now better equipped in two primary ways: first, with significant and cutting-edge learning and materials to grow stewardship in the churches of their conference; second, will new skills and capacity at the Conference level to improve their own fund development through training in developing a case statement, the spirituality of fundraising, creating a development plan, learning compelling story-telling, and asking for major gifts.

When asked about takeaways, the Rev. Bill Worley, Conference Minister of the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference UCC, said gathering confirmed what he already knew. "We're failing to train church leaders, across the board, on the basics of creating financially healthy congregations. It's not that hard to do."

Said Cynthia Bailie, director of OPTIC, "This is the first of what we hope are many opportunities for leadership and learning as we strengthen our covenental commitments to working together to create and implement new ways to invite investment in the mission of the United Church of Christ."
